KS3 & KS4 ASSESSMENT DIARY

Week Beginning: 20 January 2025

At MRC, students in Years 7-10 sit three assessments per year, with Year 11 sitting more, especially in core subjects, to help preparations for GCSE exams in the summer. These assessments support students to reflect on their progress, provide opportunities to practice and prepare for KS4 GCSE assessments in a 'low stakes' situation, provide teachers with an objective and comprehensive piece of work to judge students progress and an opportunity to report to parents/carers an accurate measure of their child's academic progress. These assessments cannot be 'failed' and simply give us all an indication of progress and attainment in different subjects – for many an encouragement, for a few some motivation to commit to hard work and progress.

Assessments are coming up for the following year groups:

· Year 11: in class assessments are taking place now

· Year 10: in class assessments begin for all subjects from 20 January 2025 onwards

• Year 9: in class assessments for all subjects (except English, mathematics and science) in the

fortnight beginning 3 February 2025 United Learning assessments for English, mathematics

and science in the fortnight beginning 27 January 2025

· Year 8: United Learning assessments for English, mathematics and science in the fortnight beginning

27 January 2025

· Year 7: United Learning assessments for English, maths and science this coming week 20 January

2025 onwards

Over the next week or two, class teachers will be sharing details of forthcoming assessments with your child, including the length of assessment, type of questions, topics that will be in the assessment and some revision activities that will be useful to help your child prepare. This will be available on Arbor as an assignment. Additional information and revision guidance can be found on the college website (https://www.mrc-academy.org/curriculum/revision-resources) at any time; this page provides useful ideas and strategies to support independent and effective revision by any child at any time.

Experience shows us that students who are well rested, have had a good breakfast and are properly prepared with the right equipment experience less stress and anxiety before assessments, and perform better. We thank you for supporting your child in their preparation.

We are also mindful that these assessments can create a degree of stress and anxiety – please do contact your Head of Year for support and advice should this be the case.

REVISION MATTERS

All schools test students regularly to gauge progress and report to parents. To help MRC students learn good exam technique, stay calm and do well in exam conditions we test students in core and foundation subjects from Year 7 onwards. By the time our students sit their actual GCSEs, and A levels, the exam room environment feels very familiar, so they can concentrate well on each question paper. Currently, Year 11 students must sit between 25 and 30 GCSE papers over 5 weeks of the summer term.

In view of our students needing to remember and answer questions on so much content, we are continuing to teach students more about why revision is needed and how to do it effectively. Each year group will have time dedicated to learning about and practising revision techniques in assemblies, tutor time and lessons. This year we want students to master a small number of revision techniques that they can apply independently when tests are coming up, so they can enter each test or exam feeling well prepared and confident.

Effective revision should be FLAT!

- Focused, put phones away, turn off the TV, find a quiet space and concentrate
- Long term, planned for rather than last minute, checking what's going to be tested to make the
 revision useful and relevant.
- Active, doing something creative, colourful, verbal or thoughtful with a sheet, notes or learning materials, not just copying it out.
- **Transformed**, the revision notes, card, audio recording made should look different and or be summarised and be useful for a quick refresher the day before an exam

Your child may already like making the following or should soon be trying out mind maps, flowcharts and timelines. They might play Snowball, Chocolate Bar, Lift Pass or Odd One Out in class and then demonstrate these revision tools to you at home. Thank you to so many parents and carers who support children at home with revision. We hope everyone will find some of these games and techniques help them revise and retain more knowledge and skills before exams.


Author of the Month

- Membership of the TOP Orchestra.






